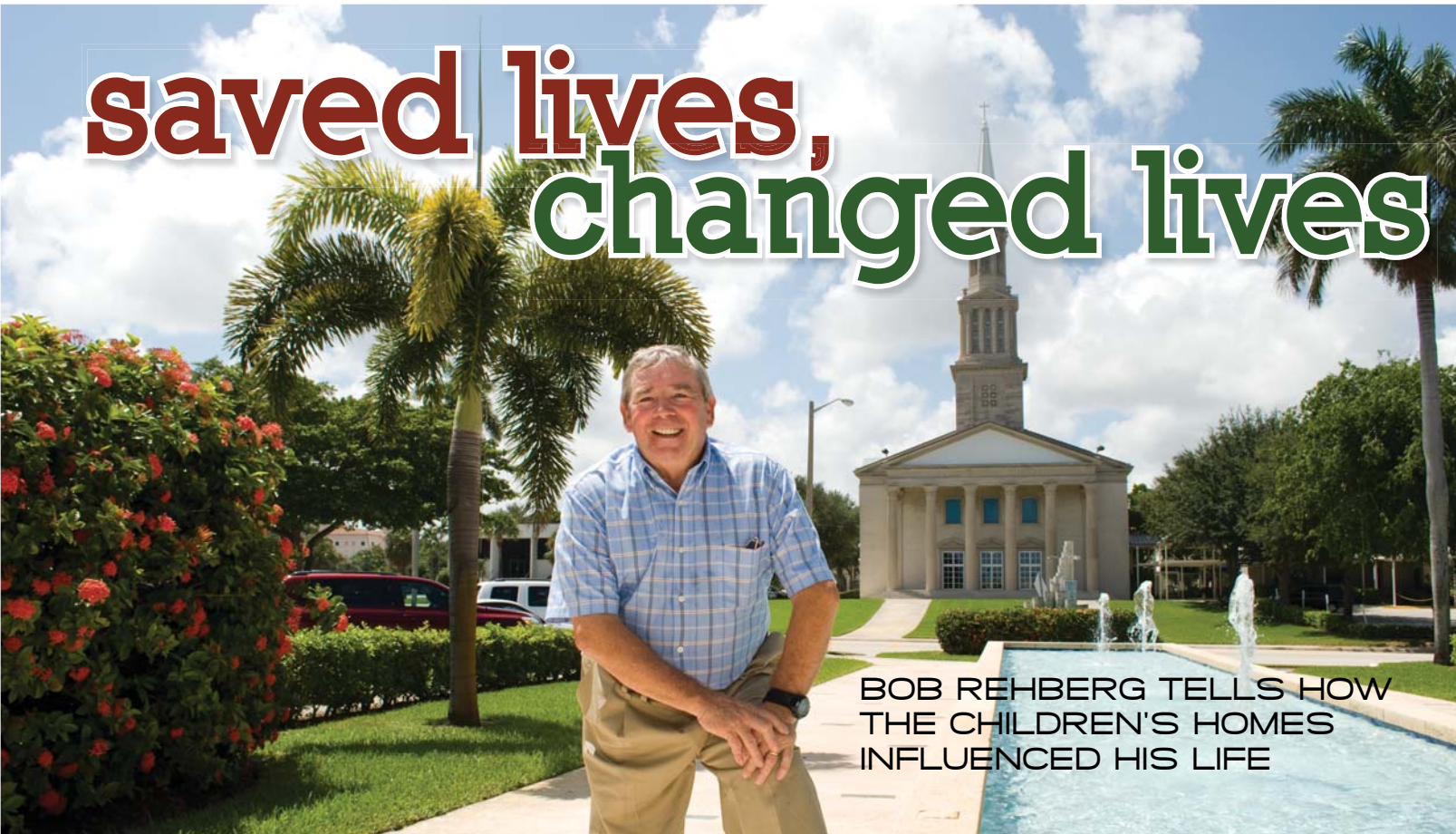

# saved lives, changed lives



**BOB REHBERG TELLS HOW THE CHILDREN'S HOMES INFLUENCED HIS LIFE**

BOB REHBERG LIVED AT THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES IN LAKELAND FROM 1952 UNTIL 1958 AND RECENTLY SHARED HIS EXPERIENCES.

We met for lunch at the City Diner on Dixie Highway in West Palm Beach along with his good friend Warren O'Brien who has been a long time supporter of the Children's Homes.

The first thing he wants me to know is that the Children's Homes was a very positive influence in his life.

"I loved the Children's Homes. I couldn't have imagined a better place to grow up," Rehberg said in between the hearty hellos from other patrons that come into the restaurant. "My two sisters and I were well cared for and loved by everyone there. It's also the place where I learned about Jesus."

"I gave my life to the Lord when I was nine years old at a revival meeting held by Central Avenue Baptist Church where we attended," Rehberg said.

"My house parents were everything to me, Mr. and Mrs. Lowe.

We laugh as he tells stories about life at the Children's Homes in the 1950s. "The campus was surrounded by orange groves back then. We played in the groves and ate oranges all the time. I don't remember ever being sick," Rehberg said.

"My house parents loved me and stood up for me. I remember in the third grade I got into trouble for fighting. My house parents consoled me and told me that everything would be alright. After that I never wanted to do anything again that would disappoint them."

Rehberg then gazes out the window and with a look of sadness describes when he and his two sisters went back home.

"My mother was eventually able to get us back. However, it was a very dysfunctional environment. We moved around a lot, skipping out on rent. Things like that. I remember lying in bed at night wishing that I was back at the Children's Homes. I really missed going to church."

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"I am so thankful that my sisters and I went to the Children's Homes. I wish I could thank everyone who has ever helped the Children's Homes. "

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His family moved to the North Hollywood area when he was in the 9th grade. A year later he started looking on his own for a church to attend. He walked into First Baptist Church of West Palm Beach and stayed there for 26 years, where he taught Sunday school and performed in the annual Christmas play. He currently attends First Baptist Church at Lake Worth, which is closer to his home.

Rehberg graduated from Palm Beach High in 1965 where he was a stand out in track, placing third in the state one year in the high hurdles. After high school he went on to attend Palm Beach Community College.

"I loved track and field and planned to become a track coach. However, God had other plans for me. I realized that I would be drafted soon, so I enlisted in the Army and was eventually accepted into the Ranger program and Officer Candidate School."

"During a break from training I was able to come back to Palm Beach for a couple of weeks. During that time I met a young girl from church who needed a ride to work because of car trouble. I ended up driving her around almost every day."

"At the end of my two week leave we were sitting in a Sunday evening service at the First Baptist outdoor Chapel by the Lake. Out of nowhere I turned to her and said 'I think we should get married.' She responded by saying 'sounds good to me.' We got married a week later. I'm not sure if we really ever dated."

Rehberg has been married to his wife Diane for 42 years. He joyfully shares pictures of his family, which includes two daughters and four grandchildren.

As he starts to describe leaving the Army, his friend Warren puts up his hand and says, "I think Bob just left out a whole lot of important information about his military service."

I then learned that Rehberg received two Purple Hearts (wounded in action) and three Bronze Stars for bravery and heroism in combat while serving in Vietnam.

Rehberg describes the Army as a calling in his life. "The infantry and leading men, that's what I was called to do. I don't know. It just came easy to me."

"Although, when I came back from Vietnam I had some problems adjusting. But fortunately, my wife stuck with me and through prayer and Christian counseling over the years we made it."

Rehberg eventually found a quieter line of work more conducive to family life working for the Postal Service.

Today Rehberg is retired from the Postal Service after 24 years. He also retired from the Army Reserves in 1996 as a Lieutenant Colonel. He continues to be active in his church and also occupies himself as an occasional actor, doing parts in commercials.

"I got an agent and have done a couple of commercials and even helped out with a

student movie. I just think that it's a lot of fun, and you get paid!" After lunch we drive down to the Chapel by the Lake where he shows me where he proposed to his wife 42 years ago.

He looks out over the water and says, "You know, my two sisters and I all married young and we all stayed married to our first spouses. And we have always been very close. I think it's because of what we went through together."

"Despite the pain and hardships of our family situation, the Children's Homes made a difference in our lives. It was there that we learned about family, friendships, and caring for one another. We also learned about the eternal hope that only God can give."

"I am so thankful that my sisters and I went to the Children's Homes. I wish I could thank my house parents and everyone who has ever helped the Children's Homes. "

Taking a break and having some fun! During the last day at the Malnutrition Center everyone took a break and took a ride on a nearby zip line.

As a result we arranged three different mission opportunities for our kids this year, which included trips to Tampa, New Orleans, and Guatemala. This most recent trip to Guatemala

was an eye-opening experience for our kids as none of them had ever been out of the country or on an airplane! In all we had nine kids participate representing our campus locations in Pensacola, Tallahassee, Jacksonville, Lakeland, and Miami.

“The mission trip focused on assisting the staff at the Children’s Malnutrition Center in San Juan, Guatemala. Daily activities included giving baths, dressing, and feeding as well as simply spending time with all of the children,” said Aleesa Harris, program coordinator for the Children’s Homes. “Our kids helped to serve more than 70 children at the Center.”

Harris said that the kids really had their eyes opened to the needs of the world. “Even though our kids have not had an easy time in their life, they all realized

that they are indeed blessed to be able to live at the Children’s Homes,” Harris said.

“One of our kids who was changing a messy diaper turned to me and asked, ‘Ms. Aleesa, is this something that Jesus would do?’ We laughed and laughed, but it was moments like these that made me realize what missions in the name of Jesus were all about.”

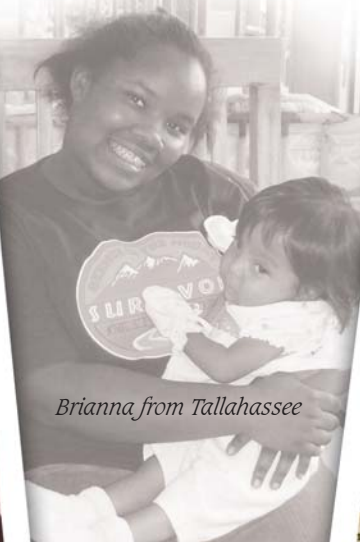

## PARTNERSHIPS WITH HAITIAN ORPHANAGES HELPS IMPROVE QUALITY OF CARE

Select administrative staff from the Children's Homes took a week off from their regular duties this summer to travel to Haiti in order to help improve the level of care at several orphanages in the Port-au-Prince area.

The 7.0 magnitude earthquake that hit Haiti last January destroyed

or severely damaged a number of orphanages in the Port-au-Prince area.

The trip focused on training childcare workers, helping to set up tents and distribute food and supplies, and assessing the overall needs in order to develop a sound long-term strategy for a new childcare ministry in Haiti.

## PARTNERSHIP WITH family stop over house



The Children's Homes and Family Stop Over House established a formal agreement to partner together to provide a permanent location for foster care services in Marianna and the surrounding area. Family Stop Over House is providing the Children's Homes' with the use of the house that they previously used as an emergency shelter for children that were removed from their home due to abuse or neglect. 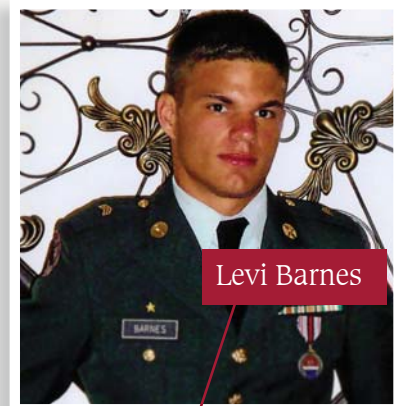
## Compassionate Heart

# pointing kids to the cross

LEARNING GOD'S PROMISE OF HEALING & COMFORT THROUGH LOSS

"BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO MOURN, FOR THEY WILL BE COMFORTED."

MATTHEW 5:4 (NIV)

Last year, my family was hit with the tragic death of my precious ten year old nephew. While trying to heal as a family, my beautiful mother died five months later. This deeply complicated our grief.

As a parent, I wanted to shelter my children from grief and the process of mourning the loss of a loved one. The Bible teaches that blessed people mourn or actively participate with the grief process, even children.

In mourning and expressing our pain, our precious Savior promises we will find his healing and comfort. As a friend recently told me, "You have to feel to truly heal!"

## **MOURNING WITH TEARS**

Letting children cry or not cry is a healthy part of the mourning process and not something to be dreaded.

I learned it was better to hold my child when they cried instead of trying to talk them out of being sad. I now look at tears as a sign of honor for the person you loved and have lost.

## **MOURNING WITH HOPE**

I will never be able to give my children back their loved one, but I can give them the hope of heaven. Verbalizing the biblical promises of eternal life gave

my children the hope of seeing that loved one again.

Our best moments as a family were sharing how amazing heaven is for our loved ones. My children especially enjoyed thinking of all the fun things their cousin and grandma might be doing together.

## **MOURNING WITH HELP**

Getting help with mourning is a sign of strength not weakness. Every child mourns differently.

I watched as my children's behaviors changed, grades fell, attitudes flared, attention-spans diminished, and nothing seemed normal.

According to Allyson Moskowitz, director of the Bethany Center for Grieving Children, children need to be given permission and grace to struggle through loss just like adults.

One of the key concepts of grief counseling we learned is to "dose" the pain of mourning with a "dose" of fun. We would "dose" a family trip to the beach after a day of sadness.

Mourning the loss of a loved one is a long journey, but God can use the hurt of tragedy to reveal unexpected treasures in our hearts.

## Help for the Grief Process

Be proactive. Contact your local hospice agency to find out about free grief counseling services.

Be honest about what you need when people ask if they can help.

Be ready to find support. Reach out to supportive friends for you and your child.

Be an advocate for your child, and tell teachers and caregivers about your child's situation.

Be realistic about the grief process and expectations. It takes lots of time to heal, and it can be difficult.

Be willing to take grief in "doses" and don't forget a "dose" of family fun.
