This was just one of many activities that a select group of kids from the Children's Homes participated in as part of a week-long mission trip to the Tampa area during their spring break vacation.

On their first day they worked with First Baptist Tampa to hand out fliers in surrounding neighborhoods to encourage people to attend an Easter outreach event at the church.

The next day started with helping North Rome Baptist Church paint their fellowship hall in preparation for their upcoming Easter luncheon. They spent the next several days at Metropolitan

Ministries, a homeless outreach center in downtown Tampa, where they helped sort clothes, load furniture, stock shelves, clean the kitchen, and helped host a community outreach event where they served lunch to the homeless.

The youth missions program is a new initiative that the Children's Homes started last year in order to give some of the kids in residential care an opportunity to more fully experience what faith in action is all about.

The program has as its purpose to bring glory to God by spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ through various service projects in

Florida, the U.S., and around the world.

Eight students representing all four Children's Homes' divisions and four staff participated in the mission trip. First Baptist Church Tampa hosted the group by allowing them to use their facilities for sleeping and as a base of operation for the week's activities. They also provided lunches every day.

Henry Eagan, a former Children's Homes' resident, and his wife Betty provided a pizza lunch for the kids on their first day. Henry Eagan was cared for at the original Children's Homes' campus in Arcadia many years ago.

Aleesa Harris, a staff person with the Children's Homes who led the trip said that the kids not only did missions, but became missionaries for the week.

"The most profound impact this trip had on our kids was that they learned that they can do things, big or small, in their own community to extend Christian love and support to others," Harris said.

"At the Florida Baptist Children's Homes we work to provide for the physical, educational, and emotional needs for the kids in our care, but we also emphasize spiritual development and the need to know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior," said Charlie Cox, vice president of programs for the Children's Homes.

"We teach that helping others is what faith in action is all about. In addition, it also gives them a sense of empowerment knowing that they can make a difference in the lives of others."

Scott Bedrosian, associate director of volunteer services at Metropolitan Ministries praised the Children's Homes' team. "Rarely have I heard a group praised as much as yours was. You all have a clear commitment to service and have made a significant difference by your many contributions," Bedrosian said.

Cori McKerly from the Jacksonville campus spoke about her experience at a recent Children's Homes' board of trustees' meeting and the impact it had on her life.

"It was such an awesome experience. I was a little unsure about myself when we were working with some of the homeless people in Tampa, but God gave me peace and assurance and I knew that by trusting him he would lead me and guide me the entire way, and he did!"

In order to participate in the mission trip students must be at least 12 years old, have accepted Christ as Savior, demonstrate a Christian lifestyle, and be recommended by their house parents. They must also fill out an application expressing why they want to serve on a mission trip.

More mission trips for students at the Children's Homes are planned throughout the rest of the summer. Some of the kids will travel to New Orleans for mission activities and another group will have the opportunity to travel to Guatemala to help at the Children's Malnutrition Center.

SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE PROGRAM TO BE STRENGTHENED WITH NEW ULTRASOUND MACHINE

A group of women from pregnancy resource centers across the state have gathered at the Children's Homes' campus in Lakeland for training on the use of an ultrasound machine.

There is great interest in how to use the machine, but also excitement as they see a clear picture of Heather Cibbert's 12-week old unborn child on the screen of the ultrasound machine. Cibbert is a volunteer at A Woman's Choice Pregnancy Center in Lakeland. Knowing that she was pregnant, she agreed to help with the training.

The Southern Baptists' Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission gave the ultrasound machine to the Children's Homes as part of its Psalm 139 Project. The project focuses on promoting awareness of the importance of ultrasound procedures in crisis pregnancy situations. They have already provided five ultrasound machines to organizations in other states, which cost \$30,000 each.

"Ultrasound machines have become a great tool in advancing the cause of the unborn. Statics show that an ultrasound procedure has an 80-90 percent chance of discouraging a woman from having an abortion," said Mary Lou Hendry, director of Sanctity of Human Life for the Children's Homes.

The Children's Homes plans to use its ultrasound machine in a mobile unit that can serve areas struck by disaster and in other under-served areas across the state.

The Children's Homes is in need of a camper style trailer that can be converted into a new mobile unit. We need a trailer that is in good condition and ready to use (late model preferred), 22-27 feet in length, and less than 7,000 pounds. orphan's heart miracles in the making

THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES IS GOING TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH IN EVEN GREATER NUMBERS TO CARE FOR NEGLECTED & ORPHANED CHILDREN IN THE DEVELOPING WORLD.

Last year we reached and served the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of nearly 3,500 hurting children and families. This year we plan to more than double that number.

Our international childcare program is now operating under the name of Orphan's Heart. This change will help us better communicate this ministry and its needs to a broad range of individuals in Florida and throughout the nation.

We have seen incredible miracles take place in the short amount of time that we have been taking our missionary journeys. However, these miracles would not have been possible without the many individuals willing to take a week out of their busy schedules and make the sacrifice to go on an international childcare mission trip.

One of our primary mission destinations over the past year has been the Children's Malnutrition Center in San Juan, Guatemala. The generous support of many individuals has created an incredible miracle at the Center.



The children that come to the Center are severely malnourished. Some children have even been brought to the center near death because of severe malnutrition.

The Center is becoming better equipped to serve these children and more children are getting better, faster.

The Center was originally only serving 25-30 children, but it is now serving close to 50 children with a goal of serving 100 children in the next several months. With the financial support from many generous individuals, we have been able to achieve the following improvements:

- *Hired two nurses*
- *Hired an extra cook and cleaning person to eventually handle an additional 50-60 children*
- *Purchased uniforms for all staff at the Center*
- *Completely remodeled the kitchen with new stoves, freezer, tile, wiring, and stainless steel tables*
- *Acquired two new washers and one new dryer for the laundry room*
- *Installed a new gas tank for the cooking and dryers*

More children are being nursed back to health and are receiving the love and the message of Jesus that they will be able to

carry with them for the rest of their lives. Please prayerfully consider going on a trip with us this year and help us spread the love of Jesus to many more disadvantaged children.
